2018 in Review:


- <u>Grand Opening of Towner Road Park</u> this facility will serve the Haslett portion of the community with sports fields, pickleball courts, 1/3 mile paved looped trail, pavilion, restroom ad parking lot.
- Installation of new interpretive signs in the Meridian Historical Village a total of five signs were installed in the village depicting life in the late 1800's and the role our structures played in our community. This project was generously funded by the Haslett-Okemos Rotary Club.
- New Trail and Directional signs in our parks a big shout out to Sr. Park Naturalist Kati Adams for managing this program starting with walking and GPS marking every trail, managing the design of the signs, and participated in the installation. In an effort to declutter signs in our parks, Kati was able to combine a map of the park, amenities, and park rules all on to one sign.
- <u>New Pavilion in North Meridian Road Park</u> Funded in part with a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Grant – ribbon Cutting scheduled for Saturday, February 2 at 6pm.
- Project planning for 2019 projects which include:
 - Farmers Market Relocation Project Working with Meridian Mall to relocate and construct a new park that includes a large pavilion to host the farmers Market with an agreement to utilize the Meridian Mall Parking lot. Construction is planned to begin this summer.
 - There is a crowdfunding event taking place now through February 8. Go to www.patronicity.com/Meridian to donate. We are working to raise \$50,000 that will be matched with funds through the Michigan Economic Development Corporation.




- Also...on Monday, January 28 from 5-8pm, Culver's Butter burgers on Marsh Road is hosting a fundraising event for the Farmers Market and LuAnn and her staff will be there as servers dressed in their vegetable costumes!
- o <u>New footbridge and restroom facility in the Historical Village</u> funded in part by a grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund together with the Park Millage. Construction will be completed later this summer.
- Central Meridian Regional Trail connector is a 1/3rd mile paved trail through Central Park that includes an overlook dock in the Central Park South pond. This project is funded in part by the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund together with the Park Millage.
- Marris Nature Center Pavilion and composting year around restroom facility Grants were received from the LWCF, MNRTF, Capital Region Community Foundation and the Harris Nature Center Foundation for this project. Construction is scheduled for later this summer. The Nature Center has become a total destination location in our community and these projects will encourage even greater use of our park and paved and natural trails, Nature Exploration Area, as well as the Nature Center itself.

Community Background

The community of Meridian Township lies along the eastern border of East Lansing and the campus of Michigan State University and in close proximity to the Michigan State Capitol. Centrally located in the palm of Michigan's hand, Meridian Township has nestled within its borders two healthy and active communities; Haslett and Okemos. A smaller portion of the Township is comprised of East Lansing and Williamston mailing addresses.

Founded in the early 1800's along the Red Cedar River as a trading point, Meridian Township residents enjoy quiet, safe, and well maintained connected neighborhoods with outstanding schools, exceptional public safety, and plenty of parks, pathways, and recreational opportunities for visitors and families to enjoy. With natural beauty on roads, interurban pathways, and a vibrant business corridor, Meridian Township is a great atmosphere for families, seniors, and young professionals.

With a population sitting at around 41,139 and a park system that has 911.58 acres of park land in 29 parks and 798 acres of land preserves, Meridian Township welcomes visitors from surrounding areas to its parks and to the largest lake within 25 miles of the State Capital, Lake Lansing. A destination for raising families since before the turn of the century, Meridian Township offers an array of quiet neighborhoods and an abundance of natural beauty with four seasons of outdoor activities.

Where it all Started


In 2005, Richard Louv introduced the term, "Nature Deficit Disorder" in his book Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children from Nature Deficit Disorder; bringing nationwide attention to the physical, emotional and ecological literacy losses that people, especially children, have suffered in the last 50 years. While it has always been the goal of Meridian Township's Harris Nature Center to provide opportunities for people of all ages to engage in nature experiences through programs such as guided walks, educational classes, stewardship, and personal time on the park trails, we still felt that we could do more to encourage nature play.

Working with the volunteer organization, Harris Nature Center Foundation (HNCF), staff began in 2012 to create a plan for the Nature Exploration Area (NEA), a space within Meridian Riverfront Park, near the nature center building, which would provide children an opportunity for unstructured, imaginative nature play. Meridian Township launched the effort by hiring Viridis Group to translate our ideas into a concept drawing which the HNCF could use for fundraising and igniting community excitement for this project. Six years later, we have a quarter-acre nature play area that is enjoyed by 20,000 people each year.

Ground Breaking Start

After initial fundraising efforts, the Harris Nature Center Foundation was able to commission local artist Doug DeLind in 2013 to build a climbable turtle sculpture that children, young and old, could climb on and play under. The concrete turtle which is approximately six feet tall and eight feet long has bright patterns on the shell made with ceramic tiles and lake stones donated by local businesses and individuals. It has become a favorite photo spot for park visitors as it stands near the parking lot like a beacon, drawing folks into the Nature Exploration Area.

While the HNCF continued fundraising for some of the larger NEA features, we worked with the Michigan State University Accounting Club in 2014 to create an area where kids could use their imaginations to build things using natural materials. We called it Sticks and Stones. The volunteers dug out a depression and collected saplings and rocks so that building materials would be handy for young engineers wanting to create a structure. Kids have built things like a giant bird's nest, a shelter and a fox's den. The same year, volunteers from a local business, Emergent BioSolutions, spent an afternoon constructing a split rail fence on the north side of the Nature Exploration Area to protect visitors from a steep drop.


Project Funding

In 2015 the HNCF received a \$10,000 grant from the Haslett-Okemos Rotary Club and a \$5,000 grant from Flagstar Bank of Okemos to build the Gathering Circle. This feature, nestled in the trees at the far end of the Nature Exploration Area, includes a stage and bench seating for 75 people. We use it as an outdoor classroom and as an amphitheater for musical performances, live animal presentations and puppet shows. The stage frequently attracts impromptu singing and dancing by visitors.


When people explore in the woods, two favorite activities are climbing trees and walking along fallen logs. We wanted to re-create this experience for our visitors to the NEA. With a \$1,000 grant from the Meridian Area Business Association, volunteers Brian Van Order and Tony Bauer designed and built the Log Jam. This crisscross of large logs lying on the ground, piled up on angles and anchored in place, along with a group of stumps sunk into the ground at different heights, provides an area for kids to jump, climb and balance in true woodland fashion. It's especially fun to watch them play games such as "follow the leader" through this area.

Significance

After 3 years of research and planning, the Michigan Fossil Dig opened in 2016. This popular feature of the NEA offers the simple experience of digging in sand or a paleontological experience for kids who find, clean and identify the fossils buried in the dig. The 25 x 13 foot pit is surrounded by large rocks to define the edges and help keep the sand in. In the middle are 3 large rocks brought down from the LaFarge quarry in Alpena that are full of fossils and also divide the dig in half. Small Paleozoic sea fossils such as corals, trilobites, brachiopods and gastropods are buried in the sand on one side while the other side holds casts of Pleistocene mammal bones and teeth from mammoths, mastodons and giant beavers. Interpretive signs around the dig allow kids to identify the fossils they find and understand the concept of the geologic timeline. Volunteers worked with experts from Michigan State University, University of Michigan and American Institute of Professional Geologist to insure that all scientific information presented was correct. The Michigan Fossil Dig required a lot more funding than the previous features we had developed, but the geologic community, as well as the Red Oak Foundation and citizens at large, were generous with their support.



Nature Exploration Area



At one point during the development of the Nature Exploration Area, a group of students from Michigan State University (MSU), as part of a class assignment, interviewed preschool children to get their input on a natural-style play house. This launched us on a wonderful experience in community partnership as the Beaver Lodge feature unfolded. Another group of MSU students from the same class found an architect willing to design the Beaver Lodge for us. After creating the drawing, David Vanderklok of Studio [intrigue] Architects offered to build the structure himself and find funding for the majority of the materials needed. Because this playhouse represents a beaver's lodge, it is built from saplings and is surrounded by a glass deck to represent the water. Beavers' lodges are primarily underwater with the entrance hole also underwater, therefore our glass deck is 6 feet above the ground. Kids can play under the "water" and enter the playhouse there and they can climb stairs up to the surface of the "water" for a bird's eye view of the surrounding area. Many volunteers were involved in harvesting over 100 saplings, removing their branches and carrying them from the woods to the project site. Construction firms such as Aaron Glass, Kelly Brothers and VanErmen Smith made in-kind and monetary donations to the project as well, while David and his team from Nobody Wants a Skinny Santa hand-built the entire feature. Since its completion in June 2018, children and adults have marveled at this unique feature, which seems fitting since beavers are known for their engineering feats!

In addition to the major grants, donations and volunteer efforts mentioned above, many people and organizations contributed to the over-all project. From these funds, the Harris Nature Center Foundation also bought and installed a rope spider web that challenges children to a climbing activity and adults seem to love as a hammock for relaxing. They created pathways to connect all of the features and encourage visitors to go further into the trees and discover the entire NEA. The Kiwanis Club of Okemos built and installed benches within the Nature Exploration Area so that parents can easily sit and watch their children play. We found that having adult seating leads to longer play sessions for the children. We will be adding one last feature to the NEA: a dirt hill. At times during the building of these various features, there has been a temporary dirt hill and that always attracted children the way flowers attract bees. In 2019 we will put in a permanent hill with a small slide on one side- a great place to play at being river otters!

The best part of creating and building the Nature Exploration Area has been the positive response from our community. It has been gratifying to see visitors come to play in the NEA and then head out on the trails for a walk. This is exactly the result that we were hoping for!



Meridian Township, MI - The Harris Nature Center Foundation will be hosting an online auction for a Mackinac Bridge Adventure Package beginning Saturday, January 26th through Friday, February 8th.



"If any of our residents have spent a Saturday watching soccer at North Meridian Road Park, they know how desperately we needed a shade structure."


