



#### **New pavilion**

#### Summary

- Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Development Grant
- Grant request includes a new pavilion, four shade trees, electricity, water, two universally accessible grills and three handicapped accessible picnic tables.
- Estimated project cost is \$250,000 with a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF) fund request of 75% (\$187,500) and a local match from the General Fund of 25% (\$62,500)
- Grant results will be announced in December 2014

#### 1. Call Meeting to Order

Chair Wilson called the meeting to order at 6:02 pm.

#### 2. Roll Call

#### 3. Approval of Agenda

Director Maisner asked to remove item #11 – New Business, #b – Support – HNC Foundation Play Area Grant because additional information is needed to complete the grant application.

#### 4. Wonch Park Pavilion – Grant Request MNRTF

At the February 4 Special Meeting, the Park Commissioners discussed and evaluated possible projects for grant consideration. By consensus, they agreed to continue with implementation of the Wonch Park Master Plan by requesting funding assistance for a new pavilion. Staff will prepare the application that is due April 1, 2014. Director Maisner suggested that the Park Commission hold the public hearing to obtain feedback from residents during the March 11, 2014 meeting. The Commission will also have the opportunity to pass a resolution of support for grant submission during that same meeting. If approved, the Township Board will take action on the resolution at their March 18 regular meeting. A motion to schedule a public hearing on March 11, 2014 has been drafted for consideration during the regular meeting.

#### 5. 2013 Park Volunteer List

The Commissioners reviewed the draft 2013 Park Volunteer List. Haslett Lego Club was changed to the Haslett Robotics Club. After careful review and discussion of deserving volunteers, it was the consensus of the Commission to choose Kelly Colflesh as the 2013 Park Friend of the Year. This selection will be formally announced during the Friends of the Parks Volunteer Recognition Ceremony in May.

#### 6. Capital Improvement Projects (CIP)

Director Maisner summarized the discussion from the February 4<sup>th</sup> special meeting and the draft 2014-2019 CIP documents. The Commissioners discussed:

- Top five priorities (it was noted the vote numbers listed in the minutes were inaccurate and were corrected)
- With current funding, the CIP has been more of a wish list than a budgetary planning tool.
- Projects are listed because interest and need has been expressed by residents
- Asked for what the General Fund is responsible. The Township's General Fund is currently responsible for all improvements and maintenance to General Fund Parks (pre-1984). The proposed millage language states that the new park millage will be responsible for development of <u>all parks</u> and maintenance of current Millage Parks. The General Fund will continue to fund maintenance of General Fund Parks.

#### 7. 2014 Park Millage Ballot Proposal

Director Maisner summarized the information on the 2014 proposed millage for park improvements, renovation, maintenance and operations in the meeting packet. Information was gathered from the 5-Year Parks and Recreation Master Plan, Capital Improvements Program and from how the parks system operated under the current millage. The absentee ballots go out in July.

#### 9. Director's Report

Van Atta Road Bridge Replacement – Van Atta Road is closed now through June. Access to the Nature Center is from the south from Jolly Road. With the

new bridge construction, there will also be the construction of a canoe landing adjacent to the Harris Nature fire pit area.

#### Projects we are working on include:

- Legg Park: working on entry drive paving project
- Newton Road Park: working with Planning Department on the parking lot construction; construct in the spring
- **Wonch Park**: Township was awarded a MNRTF Grant to construct a paved loop trail; working on construction plans with Engineering Department; plan to construct this summer.
- **Maps:** Staff is working on updating park trail maps and including them on the Pedestrian/Bicycle Pathway Master Plan. The end goal is to create a user friendly/interactive map app for smart phones.
- Family Fun Guide: This next issue will cover programs and activities from March through December 2014. The following issue will become an annual publication coming out in January 2015. We plan to make greater use of target marketing, social media and utilize other Township communication resources as part of an effective marketing plan. The Family Fun Guide has become just as much a Township Resource Guide and a Parks and Recreation promotional brochure. This annual publication will continue to have a chronological listing of programs and events for easy reference and can be utilized by real estate companies in marketing our community.
- Wonch Park: writing a grant application for construction a new pavilion. The
  project cost is \$250,000 with a local commitment of \$62,500. The project will
  consist of a pavilion, handicap accessible tables, grills and shade trees. The
  application is due April 1.
- **Annual Report**: Staff just completed the department's portion of the 2013 annual report and a copy was distributed to the Commissioners. The Township's annual report will be available later this month. **Director Maisner** reported new this year was the inclusion of the "economic impact" of youth and adult sports in our community. This information was derived from survey responses on additional recreation spending from program participants. A total of 3,005 youth and adult sports participants created and estimated \$310,493 of additional commerce in our community in 2013. The 737 Williamston participants spent an additional \$126,095 on things such as equipment, gas, food and pre and post-game activities. There is also a list of all partnering individuals, groups, organizations and businesses who contributed to many successful programs and events in 2013. Also noted are the total number of volunteers in our parks and recreation programs last year. A total of 1,052 people volunteered 33,983 hours which had a value of \$701,069. Many thanks to our volunteers.

#### c. ICDC Controlled Burn Request – Towar Park Rain Gardens

Director Maisner reported the Ingham County Drain Commissioners Office is requesting once again to conduct a controlled burn in the rain gardens in Towar Park. Controlled burning in those areas has been done on an annual basis since 2010. They are proposing the same program once again. They work in conjunction with our Fire Department and a licensed contractor who performed the burn last year and will be notifying residents.

CHAIR WILSON MOVED, COMMISSIONER JARAMILLO SECONDED, TO APPROVE THE REQUEST FROM THE INGHAM COUNTY DRAIN COMMISSIONERS OFFICE TO CONDUCT CONTROLLED BURNING IN THE RAIN GARDENS NEAR SNELL-TOWAR RECREATION CENTER AS AN EFFECTIVE WEED CONTROL MEASURE IN 2014. #### a. Park Millage Ballot Proposal

Director Maisner offered the following history and summary of the Park Millage Ballot proposal:

- Residents currently pay a .317 millage to support the Meridian Township Park System. This amount has not increased since the millage was first supported by voters in 1984.
- The Park system has grown from 325 acres in 1984 to 904 acres today.
- On April 16, 2013, the Meridian Township Board unanimously approved placing a ballot proposal before voters on August 5, 2014 requesting a new park millage consisting of 2/3rds mill (\$0.6667 on each \$1000 of taxable value) to fund activities that maintain and enhance community parks.
- August 5, 2014 general election ballot It would raise approximately \$1,042,000 to support necessary park improvements, renovation projects, maintenance, and operations
- The proposed millage would be levied for a period of twelve (12) years, 2014 through 2025 inclusive
- If approved, the owner of a home with a taxable value of \$100,000 would pay \$66.67 per year in property taxes for the next twelve (12) years.
- If approved, the existing .317 park millage would sunset in 2016 and not be requested for renewal.
- A total of over \$8,000,000 of park projects and improvements have been identified in the Capital Improvements and other necessary repairs.
- If approved, an estimated \$6,000,000 will be available for park development and improvement projects in the next twelve years.
- Planning and research is included in the 5-Year Parks and Recreation Master Plan and Capital Improvements Program.

Commissioner Stephens asked for volunteers to assist with the Park Millage Campaign. There are over 900 acres we are trying to manage with the same millage amount since 1984.

Commissioner Aronoff stated additional information on the proposal will be forthcoming and Commissioners will be visiting with the local organizations and community groups. The Commissioners will be asking for your support for this millage proposal and to join us in this campaign.

Director Maisner stated all of the research will be on the website. The Township will still be looking to leverage the Park Millage dollars through volunteers, donations and grants. Community engagement is important and this is a modest request.

Chair Wilson stated this request is not only for development but to also supplement ongoing and future maintenance issues. Our park system has grown since the last millage renewal with additional facilities and amenities that need attention. The Commission and staff have kept mindful of what is existing along with adding new as needed.

Commissioner Stephens stated this is a good investment of an additional \$67 per household in the Township and when supporting parks you are expanding your own "backyard".

Commissioner Stephens stated he attended the Ingham County Parks meeting where they awarded John Hessey with their Volunteer of the Year award. Mr. Hessey developed and runs the Dr. Bill Earl program in Ingham County Parks and is a member of the Mid-Michigan Salmon and Steelhead Fisherman's Program.

\$6 million revamp of Meridian Township's park system is being envisioned over the next 12 years but hinges on voters approving a tax increase in August.

The millage proposal — for .67 mills — will be on the Aug. 5 ballot and would add to an existing millage of .31 mills. That millage was originally approved in 1984, mainly for maintenance and oper-

ations.


Since then, the park system has nearly tripled from 325 acres to more than 900 acres, and residents in several surveys have pointed to the parks as the reason they like living in the township, LuAnn Maisner, parks and recreation director said. The township has 29 parks.

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

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



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

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

"Hillbrook park needed a restroom the day it was built," said Todd Wilson, chair of the Meridian Township Park Commission. "Anyone who has sat through a baseball game and made the mistake of drinking too much beer knows that Hillbrook needs a restroom."

Commissioners discussed pursuing a new millage. The current millage is not enough to support all of the needs of each location.

The parks currently face problems such as child safety due to broken jungle gym equipment, poor parking options and lack of facilities.

"People are not willing to donate to repaying a driveway. The dog park would be something that the community could get a lot of use of."

This year, the committee hopes to replace the pavilion at Wonch Park. It has been there for nearly 20 years. The pavilion does not have a water source or electricity for the parks' guests.

The next park commission meeting will be at 6:00pm Mar. 11.

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

During the Park Commission special meeting on February 4, 2014, the Park Commission discussed and evaluated possible projects for grant consideration. By consensus the Commission unanimously agreed to continue with implementation of the Wonch Park Master Plan by requesting funding assistance for a new pavilion and amenities through the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. The grant request will include a new pavilion, 4- deciduous trees, electricity, water, and 2- universally accessible grills and 3-handicapped accessible picnic tables. The estimated project cost is \$250,000 with a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRT) fund request of 75% (\$187,500) and a local match from the General Fund of 25% (\$62,500).

A public hearing is being conducted during the March 11, 2014 Park Commission meeting. Prior to the public hearing, letters of support for the MNRT Grant submission were received from the Meridian Township Downtown Development Authority, Meridian Area Resource Center, Meridian Township Economic Development Corporation and Ingham County Parks.

Wonch Park is a highly utilized facility for picnics and activities and the existing pavilion is no longer effectively meeting the needs of our park users.
