

Itsell is a senior at Okemos High School where he is an active

member of the band. He served as drum major for the marching band and plays trombone in the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and jazz band.

He was been in scouting for more than 12 years.

He began as a Cub Scout with Pack 164 at Hiawatha Elementary School where he earned his Arrow of Light.

He has served in several leadership positions, including scribe, assistant patrol leader, patrol leader, senior patrol leader and is a member of the Order of the Arrow Brotherhood, scouting's honor society.

He is also the youngest member of a local high adventure contingent that trekked for two weeks in the mountains at Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico.

controlled burns in natural areas Vieridian Ivp. plan to conduct

MERIDIAN TOWNSHIP
— Controlled burns are being planned on township-owned property for 20 acres in the Davis-Foster Land Preserve, 5120 Van Atta Road, and 30 acres at Ingham County's Lake Lansing Park North.

The burns will occur in the next several weeks depending on the weather, and usually take place between noon and 7 p.m.

"Burn breaks" will be createdto help control the fire. The burn is done in a slow and deliberate manner with safety equip-

ment on hand to monitor and control the spread of fire.

Smoke levels will be minimized and will be directed away from residential property. Residents will be notified by mail of the date and time of the burns.

Prairies, dry oak woodlands and certain wetlands are adapted to fire and actually require it to stay healthy. Fire stimulates native plants to grow by darkening the soil and increasing its temperature, releasing nutrients,

keeping woodlands and prairie more open and sunny and discouraging plants that are not adapted to fire, such as non-native invasive species.

"These areas are definitely in need of a prescribed burn. Our hope is that the fire will stimulate the beautiful wildflowers that once grew in these natural areas and that it will also help control the invasive species," said Jane Greenway, Meridian Township's parks and land management coordinator. Contractors David

Borneman LLC and Plant-Wise LLC will conduct the burns, which involves the cooperation and approval of the Meridian Township Fire Inspector, Tavis Millerov and the Fire Chief, Fred Cowper. For more information, visit www.meridian.mi.us.



Winter Market

Meridian Townships winter farmers' market wraps season.


ating fresh year round has never been easier — thanks to the Meridian Township Winter Market.

Nearly 30 vendors line the JC Penney corridor at Meridian Mall with their meats, cheeses, produce, plants and other fresh products the first and third Saturday each month during the winter.

In the warmer months Meridian Township's outdoor farmers' market allows area farmers to sell produce and with the newer winter markets, vendors are now extending their growing seasons.

Green houses help vendors grow produce year round, other items sold at the indoor market are season plant arrangements, honey, syrup, baked goods, sweets, gluten-free products, eggs and more.

In addition to providing shoppers with fresher, healthier food, markets serve an educational role too, allowing customers to about different growing seasons.

Market dates

The remaining Winter Farmers' Market dates are March 1 and 15 and April 5 and 19. Market hours are 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The Meridian Winter Farmers' Market is in its fourth year and has grown both in vendor numbers and the number of market dates over the years.

In its first year around 20 to 25 vendors participated in the once-a-month market. Since then, the number of vendors has grown steadily.

By having the indoor market at a shopping mall, it increases exposure to people who may not have normally visited farmers' markets.

The Meridian Winter Farmers' Market is held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the first and third Saturdays of the month December through April.

The market is located in the JC Penney corridor of Meridian Mall, 1982 W. Grand River Ave., Okemos. The remaining winter dates are March 1 and 15 and April 5 and 19.

Michigan Bridge Cards are accepted, see the information table near the center court to get tokens to spend at the market. Many vendors also accept credit



19th Century

Schools in the 19th century were considerably different than today.

The township was divided into eight districts, each with a one-room school for grades one through eight. One person taught all the subjects to all grade levels.

This system continued in Meridian Township until 1923, when the eight

districts were consolidated into one.

A two-story brick school was constructed at the intersection of Okemos and Mount Hope roads and was appropriately named Central School. The building remains in use today at 4406 Okemos Road and serves as the Okemos Public Montessori School.


Respect Your Ceiling

Tips and ideas to liven up a room by changing the ceiling.

eilings are the Rodney Dangerfield of interior spaces, they get no respect. Years ago decorating ceilings was a common practice. Then in more recent years they became forgotten. I'm not sure why this happened but it's time to start including ceilings into the room design. When making the decision on how to address your ceiling consider your room size, décor and budget. Choosing the right color, product, and texture can change the feeling in a room, enhance the proportions and discise any physical drawbacks.

The easiest and least expensive option is a coat of paint. Wrapping the wall color up onto the ceiling is safe but an accent color will really change the space and make a statement. I recently painted the ceiling in my living room. The color I chose was an accent color already in the room. Now those accents pop even more. There are some awesome paint products on the market today that take paint to the next level. Keep in mind

darker colors will give a cozy feeling to the space and lighter colors will make the ceiling feel higher.

There are lots of options you can add to your ceiling based on your budget and design style. Use carpentry skills to add crown molding or faux beams to create an architectural element. This will draw the eye up and make the ceiling feel higher. Recreated tin ceiling tiles can be purchased at home improvement stores in a verity of styles and finished to suit

any décor. This is a great option for covering textured ceilings. Installing bead board panels or wainscoting is a way to cover damaged ceilings. These panels can be painted or stained.

If you are working with a smooth surface applying wallpaper or fabric can give a personalized look. Choose a pattern and color that will compliment elements already in the room. Decals are a popular design trend right now. They come in endless patters and are applied easily and removed easily. Try duplicating a pattern from a throw pillow or upholstery fabric as a stencil. Use an accent color to apply the design in small areas like around a light fixture or in the corners. A mirror might be the prefect option for a small, dark space like an entry. The mirror will reflect light and make the space feel larger.

19th Century

Members built a two-story lodge in 1903 at the corner of Hamilton and Ardmore. The I.O.O.F. building still stands today.





Residents will be able to access their property






to the water to help control bacteria and changed the water every couple of days. In a few short weeks my kitchen counter sported a lovely vase of bright yellow flowers.

Vance Kincaid voiced support for the Wonch Park pavilion project and the current pathway project that is underway. He also voiced support for a new canoe landing utilizing existing culverts and concrete in river. He has spoken in support of this project with Director Maisner on numerous occaisions.

5. Public Hearing

a. Michigan Natural Resource Trust Fund Grant Request for Wonch Park Pavilion

Chair Wilson declared the public hearing open at 7:11 pm.

Parks and Land Management Coordinator Greenway offered the following presentation:

- The Commission is proposing to submit a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Development Grant for Wonch Park
- The grant request includes the construction of a new pavilion to replace an existing one built in 1972, planting of four (4) shade trees, electricity, water, two universally accessible grills and three handicapped accessible picnic tables

- The estimated project cost is \$250,000 with a Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF) fund request of 75% (\$187,500) and a local match from the General Fund of 25% (\$62,500)
- Plans for the pavilion are conceptual; construction drawings and details will be developed if/when the grant is awarded; necessary permits will be obtained; will address elements of nature and maintaining the current water flow rate; this improvement was requested in a recent survey; can function as an outdoor classroom for Project Fish and the Grand Learning Network groups who currently use the site; this pavilion is one of the highly rented facilities; in an effort to improve river access, staff is working with adjoining communities to develop a "Water Trail Master Plan" between Williamston and Lansing that identifies existing and proposed infrastructure and amenities to promote greater recreational use of the Red Cedar.
- The grants are submitted online and are due by April 1
- Grant results will be announced in December 2014, funds could be available for construction in 2015.

Parks and Land Management Coordinator Greenway read the following communications into the record:

- Letter of support from Willis Bennett, Director, Ingham County Parks and Recreation Department
- Letter of support from Brian G. Dale, Chairperson, Meridian Township Downtown Development Authority
- Letter of support from Marsha Madle, Chairperson, Meridian Township Economic Development Corporation
- Letter of support from Jay Hanks, President, Lansing Oar and Paddle Club
- Letter voicing concerns about land area misuse; construction in the floodplain and potential affect to water flow rate; and the possibility of attraction of large, loud groups which could affect adjacent neighbors
- Letter of support from Jeff Potter, resident and avid paddler

Public Comment:

Mike Swartz, President, Indian Hills Homeowners Association, voiced support for improvements to Wonch Park and support a new pavilion but is concerned about the potential for additional flooding with the construction of a paved pathway and new pavilion, and about the potential for loud evening programs. He has invited Director Maisner to their next meeting to talk about parks. He feels his neighbors will support the improvements.

Vance Kincaid, Okemos, voiced concern about the current loss of trees in the park. Currently when the police stop to lock the gate, their headlights shine across the parking lot into his windows. He is concerned about loud, noisy programs if allowed during the evening hours. He also suggested working with the Ingham County Drain Commissioner's Office to make sure any potential impact is addressed concerning water flow and erosion. He

suggested, as a future Eagle Scout project, to use the concrete currently in the river to construct a canoe launch. He also suggested the connection of Mt. Hope Road over to Marsh Road be explored to help alleviate traffic on Okemos Road and knows it will required federal funding.

Commissioners Comments:

Commissioner Banas asked how much parking is needed for canoe launch areas. She believes Ferguson Park canoe launch is in need of renovating and a new canoe launch is being constructed adjacent to the Harris Nature Center as part of the bridge reconstruction project. When asked about using permeable surface, Director Maisner replied the installation costs are higher because additional subsurface materials are required, the pathway will required on-going maintenance (vacuuming) and studies have shown that permeable pavement is more efficient when installed in larger areas like parking lots, but staff can research it. When asked if the asphalt loop trail or pavilion would impede water flow, Director Maisner replied it is constructed to not impede water flow as the cut and fill amounts are equal.

Commissioner Stephens suggested the use of plantings to absorb water and address any potential drainage issues. Commissioner Banas suggested planting Willow trees to help block lights and noise. She stated all Township parks are open dawn to dusk. Director Maisner stated during the Wonch Park Master Plan process, it was mentioned one of the future activities could include musicians at lunch time in the proposed plaza area.

Commissioner Aronoff reported this is one of the highest used pavilions and does not recall there being any problems with loud events at the site. She has received many requests for improvements to this park and has listened to the concerns and appreciates feedback from the residents.

Chair Wilson asked about need for electricity at the pavilion. Director Maisner stated the current pavilion does not have electricity, it is continually asked for and electricity is available at all of our other pavilions. Chair Wilson stated there is a permeable walkway at MSU and the general consensus is it is hard to maintain and was costly to install and since the area is restrictive, it may be hard to access to accomplish the installation in Wonch Park. The Township has had great success partnering with the Ingham County Drain Commission on recent projects and will continue that relationship with this project.

Chair Wilson closed the public hearing at 7:53 pm.

b. Harris Nature Center Foundation Nature Exploration Area

The Harris Nature Center Foundation is in the process of raising funds for the proposed Youth Nature Exploration Area. They are working on submitting grant applications to the Dart Foundation and Jackson National Life Foundation and have requested resolutions of support for each grant. This nature exploration area will offer unique opportunities for children to explore nature elements including a spider web to climb on, tree house, walkways, fossil dig experience, etc. The Foundation has been fundraising and is now in the position to seek grants to start with Phase I including the log climbing area, the fossil dig area and development of a gravel trail with an estimated cost of \$20,000. The Foundation is asking the Park Commission to commit up to \$8,000 of cash and/or in-kind services for the entire project. Park Millage funds for this project will be budgeted from the Harris Nature Center fund balance.

The Commissioners asked to receive reports from the HNC Foundation progress on their fund raising efforts. Staff stated that the project will go through site plan review before construction can begin.

A. Resolution of Support of Grant Submission to Jackson National Life Foundation

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center was founded in 1997 to provide a connection with nature for adults and children throughout the Township through programming, special events and casual visits; and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation has prepared a grant application for submission to the Jackson National Life Foundation for construction of phase I of the Youth Nature Exploration Area at the Harris Nature Center which will provide environmental education through play opportunities for all visitors with an estimated project cost of \$25,000; and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation is requesting \$5,000 from the Jackson National Life Foundation to assist with funding; and

WHEREAS, the Youth Nature Exploration Area is outlined and justified in the 2010-2015 Parks and Recreation Master Plan adopted by the Meridian Township Board and Park Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Meridian Township Park Commission is committing up to \$8,000 of cash and/or in-kind service toward the entire project from the Park Millage Fund.

Move to support submission of a grant application by the Harris Nature Center Foundation to the Jackson National Life Foundation for construction of a nature exploration area at the Harris Nature Center with an estimated project cost of \$25,000, and committing up to \$8,000 in cash and/or in-kind service from the Township's Park Millage Fund to support this project.

B. Resolution of Support of Grant Submission to Dart Foundation

The following resolution was offered by Chair Wilson and supported by Commissioner Banas:

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center was founded in 1997 to provide a connection with nature for adults and children throughout the Township through programming, special events and casual visits; and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation was established in 2006 to raise funds to support operations and capital improvements for the Harris Nature Center; and

WHEREAS, a plan has been developed to create an environmental exploration area for youth to play in the out-of-doors at the Harris Nature Center utilizing many natural elements from nature; and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation has been fundraising to support construction of this new play area through silent auctions, annual giving programs and seeking grants from other organizations, and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation has prepared a grant application for submission to the Dart Foundation for construction of phase I of the Youth Nature Exploration Area at the Harris Nature Center which will provide environmental education through play opportunities for all visitors with an estimated project cost of \$25,000; and

WHEREAS, the Harris Nature Center Foundation is requesting \$5,000 from the Dart Foundation to assist with funding; and

WHEREAS, the Youth Nature Exploration Area is outlined and justified in the 2010-2015 Parks and Recreation Master Plan adopted by the Meridian Township Board and Park Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Meridian Township Park Commission is committing up to \$8,000 of cash and/or in-kind service toward the entire project from the Park Millage Fund.

PUBLIC COMMENT

a. Park Millage Ballot Proposal

Commissioner Banas stated in preparation for the August 5th ballot proposal. the Commission will be asking for the public to support a new park millage of 2/3s of a mill to support for parks projects and maintenance. The new millage proposal will replace the current 1/3 of a mill which expires in 2016. If the new millage proposal passes this year, the Township will collect one mill for two years and in 2016, the park millage would reduce to 2/3 of a mill and run for ten years. At this point, a millage ballot committee has been formed by Park Commissioners Banas, Aronoff and Stephens with Trustee Wilson to organize communication materials and outreach to residents, neighborhood and civic groups. Last spring, the Township Board unanimously supported the Commission's request to place the increased millage proposal on the 2014 August ballot. The committee has been officially organized and is called the "Friends of Meridian Township Parks", which is separate from the Park Commission, and it can now solicit donations to spend on the ballot initiative. The Friends of Meridian Township Parks have enlisted people to serve on the community wide support team and if anyone is interested in assisting with this initiative, please contact us, everyone is welcome. Individuals are needed to assist with outreach into the community, to help share the word. In the future, the community will see flyers and other forms of communication. We are in the process of creating a website to assist with this endeavor. Our theme is to continue the high level quality of life for Meridian Township citizens and build a better future for our children. The Commission has received many communications and survey results where the citizens have stated they would support a millage. Commissioner Banas thanked Commissioners Stephens and Aronoff and Trustee Wilson for the many hours to prepare for this millage request.

Commissioner Stephens invited the public and anyone interested in assisting with the ballot campaign to attend the next meeting this Thursday at Schuler's Café. The Friends of Meridian Township Parks now have a bank account and can accept donations to help fund this campaign initiative.

Commissioner Aronoff stated if you cannot attend this week, please contact us or attend future meeting. We would are available to attend neighborhood and civic group meetings.

Chair Wilson stated he fully supports this initiative because in order to improve what the Township and the Park System has to offer, funding is crucial to improve the general quality of life for the residents. Due to economic pressures all over the State and County, it has been challenging with the current millage to maintain our facility at a level the residents have come to expect. The Commission and staff have been very mindful of what we have and if the millage proposal passes, it will address improvement needs and allow for development and support of future projects.

Commissioner Stephens stated the Commission will continue to seek grants and other funding s to assist with project developments such as the exploration area for the Harris Nature Center. Our park acreage has tripled since the current millage was passed and funding has not increased. This new millage will allow us to enhance what we have but also allow us to do more. The Commission spends funds wisely.

When asked how many acres out of our 900 acres has been donated, Director Maisner replied she is not sure but only 200 acres of all the parkland is developed currently. For many years, the Park Commission was the only entity who could receive donated land. Chair Wilson stated that although some of the land was donated, the Commission is responsible for it and in order to improve and offer outdoor experiences, funds are necessary. Director Maisner stated currently residents are paying approximately \$33/year (from a home with a taxable value at \$100,000) and under the new proposal the millage amount would increase to approximately \$67/year. History shows the Commission has been very good stewards of parks and the current collection of millage dollars is covering operations.

Commissioner Banas stated under the current millage, the Commission has not been able to develop a major project during the last ten years. We were finally able to construct a small bathroom project with a grant. We cannot continue to operate under the current 1/3 of a mill and continue to offer the kind of services that are expected by our residents. Going from 1/3 to 2/3 of a mill, it will make a significant difference in maintenance and development of new projects.
