

May Apple Trail

I mile loop: follow the white trail.

distance the path follows a fencerow of the May Apple Trail. the large Oak, Maple and Hickory trees characterized by Hawthorn, Ash, and Rec white-blossomed Anenome, leads to the head apple-like fruit in August. "umbrella-like" leaves. wildflowers is the May Apple with its large thrive. Wildflower Trail

3/4 mile trail: follow the blue trail

Begin this trail at the bridge in Nancy Moore Park or by continuing north from the tip of the May Apple Trail. Wildflowers-- Trillium, Jack-in-the-Pulpit, Spring Beauty, Trout Lily and Wild Geranium--fill the forest with color in the spring. The meadows are also strewn with wildflowers, blooming after the flowers of the woodland have faded. Pine Lake Drain, winds along the west side of the path, flowing quietly through the wooded park. The red color of the drain's water is caused by tannin, leached from fallen leaves.

Note: Some parts of these trails are located within the floodplain and may be wet, or even impassable during rainy seasons.
